# Post Mortem Interview

Post Mortem will be treading the boards at BOBI next month so it seemed timely that

the veteran Punks were hauled in for an interview. Marv had a chat with lone original member Lorraine.

Post Mortem were
originally about in the
early 80s ... what got you
all together in those
days? What was the
sound like back then?
What were your
influences?

The band was already going, but there had been

a falling out and they needed a new singer. I had recently moved from Devon, and the other members had seen me about town, Skegness is a small town, as you know. I was only 14 at the time: afterwards I was told that they had followed me back from school to my

home, but as they were all blokes and 3 years older than me, no one dared approach me they thought they looked like perverts. I looked a bit like Siouxsie. and was punky. Eventually thev asked a girl, who they already knew, her older sister used to go out with one of the band; she approached me and asked if wanted to be in a punk band. I thought she was taking the piss. I ended up going to an audition and

got the job. We were fast, punk, and we got faster as time went on, we would be described as hardcore punk. We all had different influences, I loved The Jam, Siouxie

and bands like Crass and Flux of Pink Indians. Chris the bass player. was a big fan of the Stranglers, Martin, guitarist, was keen on Iron Maiden and The Dead Kennedys.

Who did you originally play with back in

the day? Share some memories of early 80s UK Punk – good or had!

We played a gig with the band Last Orders, much later we went on a mini tour with the UK Subs, and another with Chelsea, Gene October was horrible to us, I don't think he has changed much. Good memories? Being played on the John Peel Show. a few

times. Getting letters from all around the world, I still have lots of the letters; people telling us how much they like our music. Getting a letter for Jello Biafra, who was the singer with The Dead Kennedys,

telling how much he liked our music. I decided I wanted to reform, after I went to Rebellion in 2022, my first time. I had thought I had left it too long and that those days had gone. but Rebellion filled me with inspiration and determination. I am the only original member, the others were not interested in doing anything. In 2016 I was contacted by Vomito records

from Valencia in Spain, asking if they could remaster all our old stuff, tapes, gigs and records, and put it out in the form of an LP. I





was shocked and wasn't sure if they were serious. They were and the album was released and this brought loads of interest in the band, which was also an encouragement to do something again.

## Didn't you put out a 7" single? Is it some lost and rare collector's item these days? What label was it on? Was it UK82 style Punk Rock?

We were on the same record label as External Menace. Anti Social and Uproar and we

played with them at Dingwells in Newcastle, to promote the label and our records. Beat the System was the record company's name, they went on to be Lightbeat Records. It's been on discogs for £100 before.

# What's the response been like to the new line up?

The response has been very positive, I set up a Facebook page and we are heading to 600 followers . I was incredibly nervous, always am now, before a gig, but we have had positive responses and kindness from folk, it's been bloody wonderful, made new friends along the way, too.

## What's the main differences between playing in a Punk band in 2025 and playing in a Punk band in the early 80s

The new style Post Mortem, is old school 77, sound, slower and not thrash. I have more control over the sound and it's been really great.

You have a new CD out! Loving the four tracks on there! Who released it? The artwork is pretty distinctive, who is the artist? Is the character the band's mascot!!??

The Keep the Faith, CD was brought out by us, we recorded it at a place in Lincolnshire. The illustrations were done by my Friend Jacquline Drury, who I went to art school with. The woman in the illustration is meant to be me, back from the dead!

"Watching You" and "Control" seem to have a theme of the powers that be watching our every move. Is that a fair comment? Give us some idea of what you were thinking when writing those songs.

Yes, "Watching You", is about government control, CCTV, people looking at our banks and tracing us, through what we buy and where we spend our money.money.

I know you also write quite a bit for fanzines – including this 'ere periodical - and websites. What sort of stuff do you come up with and where can we read your stuff?

I have written several reviews of gigs and festivals over the last few vears. I have written in Fail Safe Fanzine. from Nottingham. brilliant а read, put together David Ball. I have had reviews in Punk Globe

magazine, and Inspite Magazine, and several others too.

# RECORD REVIEW Paul Initonit

If you were at April's BOBI extravaganza, you will no doubt have had a bop to two great bands in the shape of Das Kapitans and Mices. Rather splendidly they have a split EP out now ... our mate Paul Initonit penned a review of this fine slab of vinyl.

Das Kapitans have finally pulled their Socks up (gettit?) and released a split EP with Mices Weekend Offender Records Bandcamp page still has wonderful 10" slabs of vinyl for you to enjoy this fine release on or the Socks On Records Bandcamp page has a digital version for all you modern folks! "So. what does it sound like?" you ask! Well DK sound like the fall has gone punk and grown a sense of humour. The weird guitar intro on I'm Out sounds a bit like a kazoo - this is a good thing by the way! The track has an indie punk feel, plenty of melody and some noisy shouting chorouses. Mices are more of an emo punk affair - but in a good way. Introduced by a wall of feedback and an infectious drum beat, Silk - their first song has a meaty composition held together by a rather strong showing of expert punk musicianship – if indeed "punk" and "expert"

is allowed in the same sentence; just don't grass me up to the punk police! Another wall of feedback introduces a plodding beat – don't be Impatient, Das Kapitans are back with track three – a basic riff provides the glue in the best punk tradition and the kids of today would say it's another "banger".

The melodic voice which helps Mices' tracks to shine is once again in evidence on Ghosts as the band make a nice contrast to DK. They are different but natural bedfellows like all the best couples! Das Kapitans then tell us about "Life" in one of those spoken word type songs which builds nicely and shows off some rather fine guitar sounds. Again, it's short — also again, like all the best punk

The cover was ... gasp ... in colour! Crumbs. Not the usual black and white, skulls and devastated rubble and mushroom clouds of the apocalyptic crust Punk mayhem I was used to. Nope, 'twas a garish affair that nowadays looks very, very dated, but at the time was enough

to see it pulled out the rack. "Erm, excuse me mate, just warn you like, that Locust 7" is £4! Funny shape and that so a bit dearer"
The proprietor of this stall piqued my interest further! What? £4 for a 7"! That was ruddy expensive back

new one on me. A puddle shaped record!

How decadent, Naturally I bought it, £4 'n all. I was by now, discovering that in the

wonderful world of Punk Rock. bands and labels have something of a penchant for a "weird format" and ves. you've probably guessed by now. I have plenty more to tell you about.

DROPDIFAD

I suppose one of the all-time classic "weird format" records is the infamous/famous/ legendary 5" split EP that Power Violence

titans Dropdead and Crossed Out released back in that fabled era known as "the 90s". With song titles such as "Nazi Atrocities". "Suffocate" and "New World Slaughter" it's patently clear that these short songs on this shorter

record are just as confrontational in lyrical content as in the, ahem, "tunes" contained

within. I imagine it was this landmark team up of two of the greatest of all the bands that went under the awesome, though faintly ridiculous. banner of Power Violence that set off a whole host of such bands knocking out tiddly

records on coloured vinyl EPs. The scene became somewhat notorious for it

One fellow I know well, who like me, is a big fan of extreme, unlistenable brutality like Dropdead and Crossed Out, and also, like me.

is driven by the Record Collecting bug decided, in his wisdom, a few years back to release a 2" record! I kid you not! Alan Growbag specialises in such mad endeavours and had penned a mini 2" sized zine called Peabrain

previously. Deciding to make the jump from zine writer to label honcho, he of course, had to come up with some hair-brained scheme for a bizarre format and thus the Peabrain 2"EP was birthed (with free 2" patch!). Available in a variety of colours ... mine's green ... and containing within its grooves, would you believe eight songs! Yes, eight songs from six

different bands, each track clocking in at six seconds Bonkers Rumour has it that our

hero Alan, only decided to do a 2" record. as it was the only size he didn't have in his collection! I will have to ask him one day. He was nice enough to send me a test pressing of the ADHD EP which ironically was on a 7" and was impossible to play, Bugger.

Switching formats, but still weird, for one more example is a the Seein Red/Shikari split

CD that is on a credit card/business card shaped disc. Legend tells, that the Dutch destroyers set out on a joint UK tour way back in the early 2000s and had a spare song each, both of which were intended to form a split release on some label that didn't come to fruition. Knocking up 110

of these ridiculous artefacts was obviously the next best thing to do and when they

> arrived in Boston on said tour for a riotous gig at the notorious Indian Queen, I of course, could not resist picking one up. Wrapped in a small brown envelope (for extra surreptitious effect) with the band's logos stamped on, it is a most strange item indeed and

a bugger to play. The IQ gig that followed has gone down in history as something of a barnstormer. Shikari were utterly horrific. Screaming metallic mayhem that was peeling people's faces off and as for Seein' Red? Well. they levelled the place. Most

> folks are happy with a t-shirt as a souvenir, but not me, I like a weird format disc to remember such shenanigans me.

> But are they worth anything I hear nobody ask? The Dropdead/Crossed Out split is

currently going for about £30. Peabrain? Someone is unbelievably asking £60 for a copy online and as for the Seein Red/Shikari credit card CD, some chancer messaged me on Discogs pleading with me to sell him it. No chance. I do love a weird format release. Do vou? Marv
